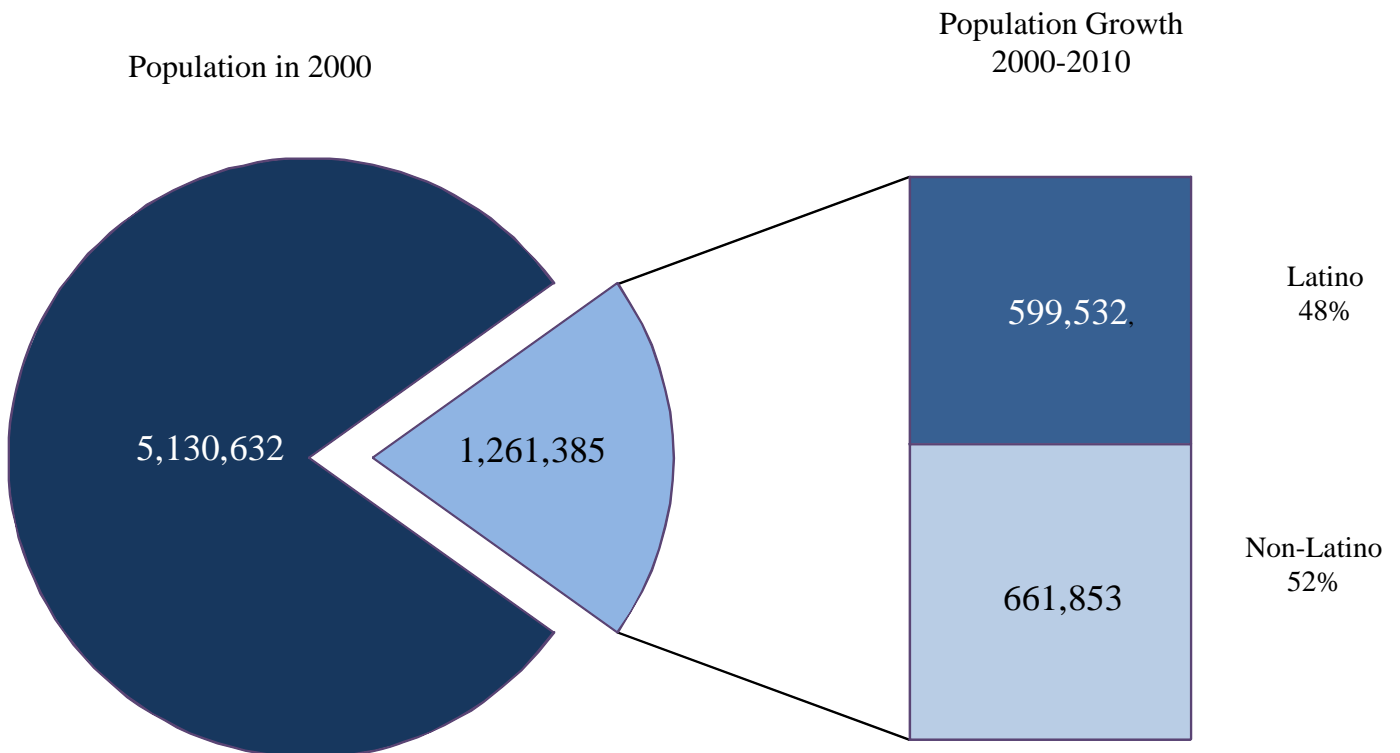

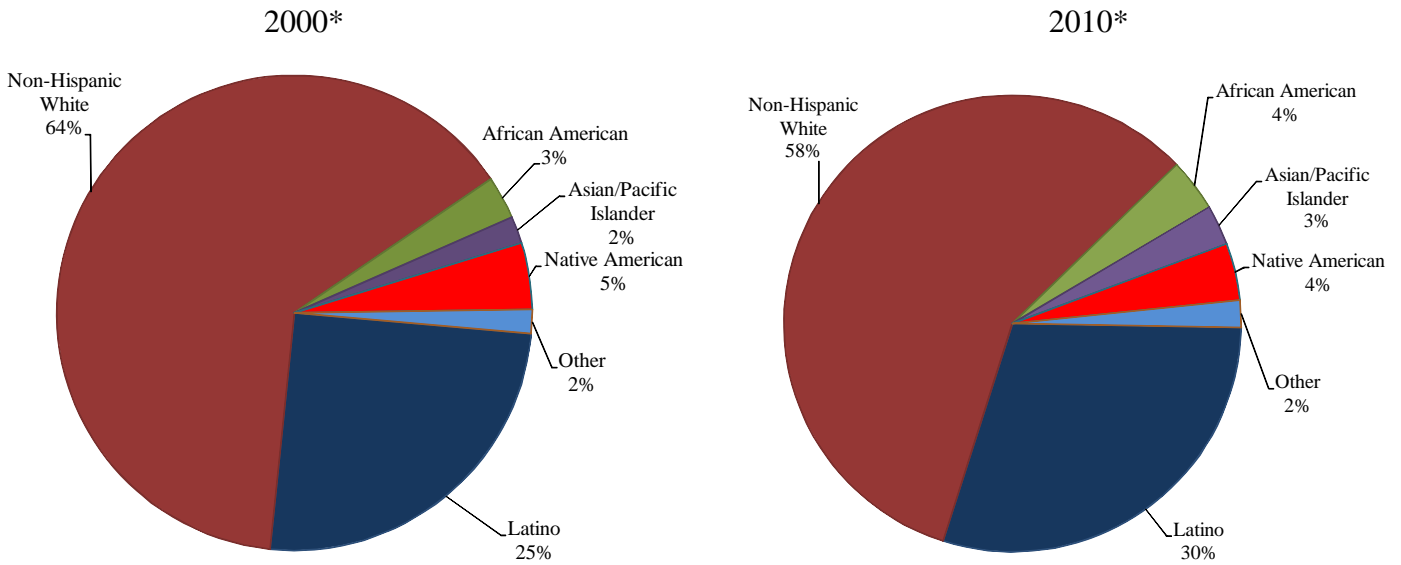

POPULATION GROWTH BETWEEN 2000 AND 2010

Between 2000 and 2010, Arizona's population grew from 5.1 million to 6.4 million, an increase of 24.6%. During the same period, the Latino population grew from 1.3 million to 1.9 million, an increase of 46.3%. The increase in Arizona's Latino population accounted for nearly half (47.5%) of the state's population growth during the last decade.

*Total exceeds 100% because of rounding

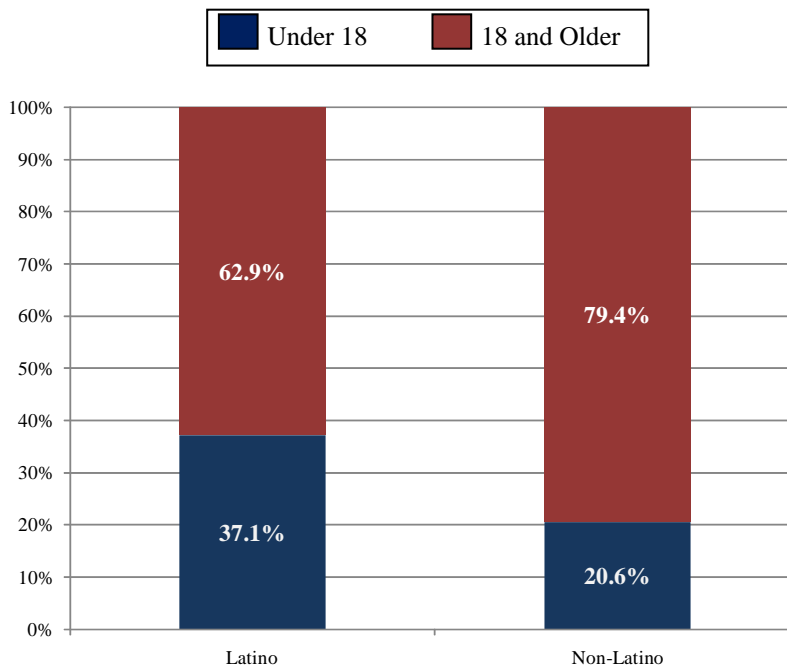
Between 2000 and 2010, the Latino share of the population grew from 25% to 30%. In 2000, 64% of Arizonans were Non-Hispanic White, in 2010, Non-Hispanic Whites were 58% of the state’s population.

AGE OF POPULATION: 2010

In 2010, 703,946 Latinos were under 18, and 1.2 million were 18 and older. Forty-three percent of all Arizonans under 18 are Latino.

In 2010, the Arizona Latino population was significantly younger than the non-Latino population. Over one-third of Latino Arizonans (37%) were under 18, compared to 21% of non-Latinos.



COUNTY AND CITY POPULATIONS: 2010

Census 2010 data reveal that most of Arizona's 10 largest counties have significant Latino populations. The Latino share of these counties' population ranges from 6% in Apache County to 60% in Yuma County. Additionally, nine of the 10 largest Arizona counties are also home to the state's largest Latino communities, including Maricopa County, Pima County, Pinal County, Yavapai County, Mohave County, Yuma County, Coconino County, Cochise County and Navajo County. Virtually all of Arizona's Latinos (96%) live in the 10 largest counties, with 60% residing in Maricopa County and 18% residing in Pima County.

Most of Arizona's 10 largest cities also have significant Latino populations. The Latino share of these cities' population ranges from 9% in Scottsdale to 42% in Tucson. Additionally, eight of Arizona's major cities are also home to the state's largest Latino communities, including Phoenix, Tucson, Mesa, Chandler, Glendale, Gilbert, Tempe and Peoria. The state's 10 largest cities are home to 63% of Arizona's Latino population, with 31% residing in Phoenix and 11% residing in Tucson.
