<sup>1</sup> As of this writing, according to unofficial election results from New Mexico, incumbent U.S. Representative Heather Wilson (R) has a slight lead over New Mexico Attorney General Patricia Madrid (D). For the purposes of this analysis, we have not included Madrid as a new Latino member of the U.S. House of Representatives. Should Madrid ultimately win, the number of Latinos in the U.S. House would increase to a total of 24.

<sup>2</sup> This reflects the vacancy in New Jersey's Congressional delegation resulting from the appointment of U.S. Representative Robert Menendez (D) to the U.S. Senate in January 2006. The vacant seat was filled in the November election by another Latino Democrat, State Assemblymember Albio Sires.

<sup>3</sup> In the aftermath of the June 2006 Supreme Court ruling on Texas' 2003 Congressional redistricting, a panel of federal judges changed the boundaries of some Texas Congressional districts, including District 23, currently held by Republican incumbent U.S. Representative Henry Bonilla (R). As a result, the November election in this district was a special election, with five Democratic candidates challenging Bonilla. To win the special election and avoid a run-off battle, a candidate needed to get at least a majority of the vote. None of the candidates received a majority, so U.S. Representative Bonilla will face former U.S. Representative Ciro Rodriguez (D) in a run-off contest. This table presents two scenarios for the composition of the Latino delegation in the U.S. House, depending on the outcome the run-off.

<sup>1</sup> As of this writing, according to California unofficial election results, Orange County Supervisor and former Democratic State Representative Lou Correa trails his opponent, Lynn Daucher (R), by 138 votes. For the purposes of this analysis, we have not included Correa as a new member of the California State Senate. Should Correa ultimately win, the number of Latinos in State Senates after the election would increase to 59 and the number of Latino Democrats would increase to 50.

<sup>2</sup> Latinos currently serving in the Illinois State Senate includes State Senator Miguel Del Valle (D), who has been appointed to serve as Chicago City Clerk. It is expected that State Senator Del Valle will leave his State Senate seat early next year. It is likely that another Latino will be appointed to his seat.

<sup>3</sup> In order to provide comparability with the data from other states, the number of Latinos currently in State Senates includes former Texas State Senator Frank Madla, who resigned from office in May 2006. Madla's seat was filled in the November election by State Representative Carlos Uresti (D).
