



2006 GENERAL ELECTION PROFILE:

LATINOS IN CONGRESS, STATE LEGISLATURES AND STATEWIDE OFFICES AFTER ELECTION 2006: A STATE-BY-STATE SUMMARY

This publication is the final in a series of *Election Profiles* that the NALEO Educational Fund has published throughout the 2006 election season. The *Profile* provides a state-by-state analysis of federal and state races involving Latino candidates, and focuses on the composition of the Latino Congressional and state legislative delegations after the November 2006 elections.

ARIZONA

FEDERAL CONTESTS

U.S. Representatives: Incumbent Democrats Ed Pastor and Raul Grijalva won re-election and will return to the U.S. House of Representatives.

STATE CONTESTS

State Senators: Four of Arizona's incumbent Latino State Senators were successful in their contests: Democrats Jorge Garcia, Richard Miranda, Rebecca Rios, and Victor Soltero. They will be joined in the Senate by Charlene Pesquiera, who unseated incumbent Republican Al Melvin.

State Representatives: All 11 Latino incumbents – Democrats Manny Alvarez, Olivia Cajero Bedford, Steve M. Gallardo, Martha Garcia, Linda J. Lopez, David M. Lujan, Robert Meza, Ben R. Miranda, Tom Prezleski, Pete Rios, and Krysten Sinema – were victorious in their re-election bids.

CALIFORNIA

FEDERAL CONTESTS

U.S. Representatives: All seven of California's incumbent Latino U.S. Representatives won re-election: Democrats Joe Baca, Xavier Becerra, Grace Flores Napolitano, Lucille Roybal-Allard, Linda Sánchez, Loretta Sánchez, and Hilda Solis.

STATE CONTESTS

State Senators: Four Democrat incumbent State Senators were successful in their re-election bids: Democrats Dean Florez, Denise Moreno-Ducheny, Gil Cedillo, and Gloria Romero. Republican incumbent Abel Maldonado is mid-way through his current term in the State Senate. These State Senators will be joined by former Los Angeles City Councilmember Alex Padilla. In addition, three Latinos who served in the California State Assembly won their races for the State Senate: Democrats Jenny Oropeza, Ron Calderon, and Gloria Negrete-McLeod. Former Orange County Supervisor Lou Correa (D) overcame a challenging race against former State Assemblymember Lynn Daucher (R) for the open seat in Senate District 34.

State Representativea: Nine of California's 19 Latino incumbent State Assemblymembers have been re-elected: Juan Arambula, Joe Coto, Bonnie Garcia, Pedro Nava, Fabian Núñez, Nicole Parra, Lori Saldaña, Hector De La Torre, and Alberto Torrico. All are Democrats with the exception of Bonnie Garcia, who is the only Latina Republican in the State Legislature.

Several other Latinos will join the California Assembly. The former mayor of Salinas, Anna Marie Caballero (D), is the new State Assemblymember for District 28. Former State Senator Richard Alarcón (D) won in District 39, and National Education Association Senior Associate Kevin DeLeon (D) won in District 45.

In District 56, former Artesia City Councilmember Tony Mendoza (D) emerged victorious, and optometrist Ed Hernandez was successful in his bid in District 57, replacing termed-out State Assemblymember Ed Chavez. In District 58, former California State Senator and its first Latino Majority Leader Charles Calderon (D) won election. Another former State Senator, Nell Soto (D) will represent State Assembly District 61, which was held by termed-out Gloria Negrete-McLeod (D).

New faces in the State Assembly also include former Santa Ana City Councilmember, Jose Solorio (D), representing District 79, and former Chula Vista City Councilmember Mary Salas (D), who won in District 79.

State Representatives: Three of Colorado's Latino incumbents in the State House sought re-election, and all won their races: Michael Garcia (D), Dorothy Butcher (D), and Rafael Gallegos (D). They will be joined by educator Edward Casso (D), representing District 32.

State Senators: All three of Florida's Latino State Senators were successful in their re-election bids: Republicans Alex Diaz de la Portilla, Rodolfo Garcia, Jr., and J. Alex Villalobos.

State Representatives: In the Florida State House races, 12 Latino State Representative incumbents were successful in their re-election bids: Susan Bucher, Carlos Lopez-Cantera, Anitere Flores, Rene Garcia, Marco Llorente, Juan Carlos Planas, John Quiñones, David Rivera, Julio Robaina, Marco Rubio, Trey Traviesa, and Juan Zapata. All are Republicans, with the exception of Democrat Susan Bucher. Marco Rubio will become the first Latino Speaker of the Florida State House. Democrat Luis Garcia, Jr., a former Miami Beach commissioner and Republican Eddy Gonzalez, a former Hialeah City Councilmember, are joining these incumbents.

They will be joined by former Cicero school board member, Elizabeth Hernandez (D), representing District 24; and former Hoffman Estates Village Trustee, Fred Crespo (D), who prevailed in a competitive race against incumbent Terry Parke (R) and will represent District 44.

U.S. Representatives: New Jersey State Assemblymember Albio Sires (D) was successful in his bid to win Congressional District 13, the seat formerly held by U.S. Senator Menendez.

State Representatives: Because elections for the New Jersey State legislature occur in years ending in an odd number, no State Assemblymembers faced an election this November. However, U.S. Representative-elect Albio Sires (D) will vacate his seat in the Assembly, leaving four incumbent Latino State Senators.

Larranaga and Gloria Vaughn. Four new Latino State Representatives will join the incumbents in Santa Fe: Democrats Andrew Barreras, Elias Barela, Antonio Maestas, and Republican Nora Espinoza.
