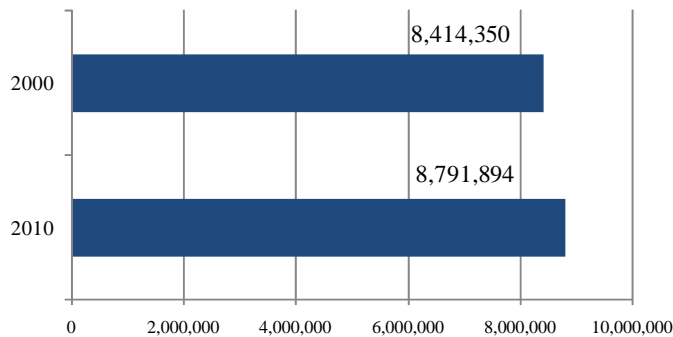

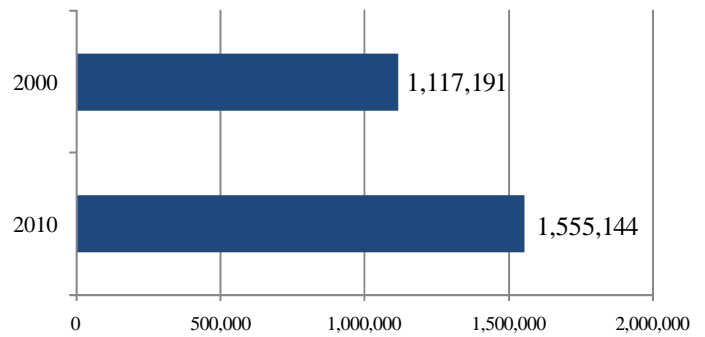
POPULATION GROWTH BETWEEN 2000 AND 2010

Between 2000 and 2010, New Jersey's population grew from 8.4 million to 8.8 million, an increase of 4.5%. During the same period, the Latino population grew from 1.1 million to 1.6 million, an increase of 39.2%.

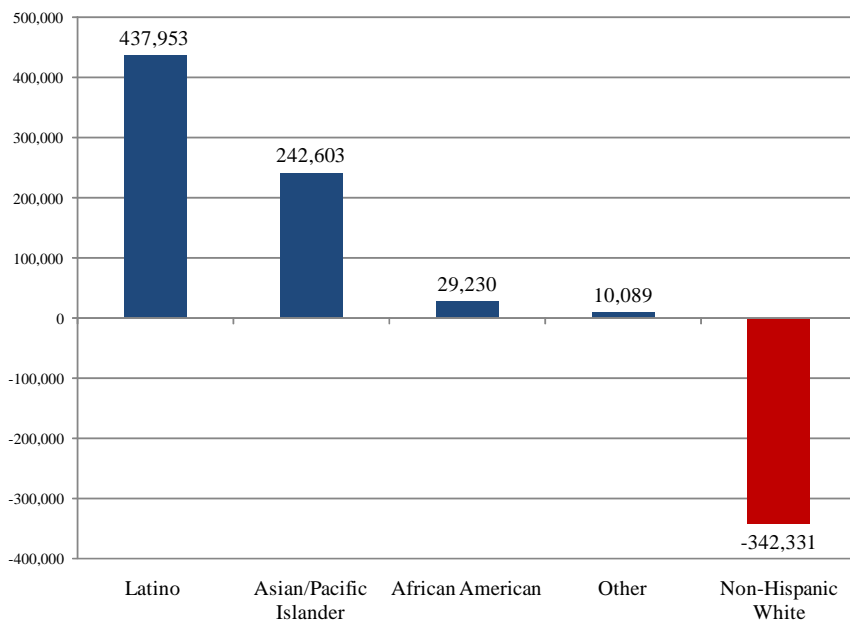
Total Population

Population Change Between 2000 and 2010 for New Jersey Population Groups

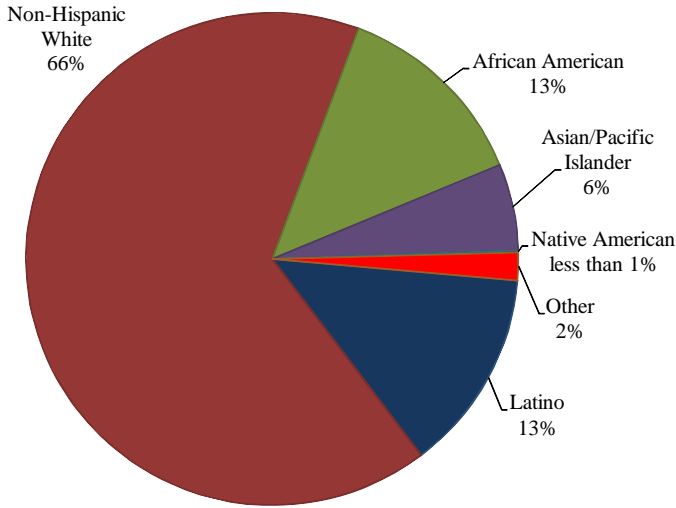


The increase in New Jersey's Latino population was responsible for the state's overall growth during the last decade. Between 2000 and 2010, the Latino population grew by 39.2%, while the non-Latino population declined slightly by 0.8%.

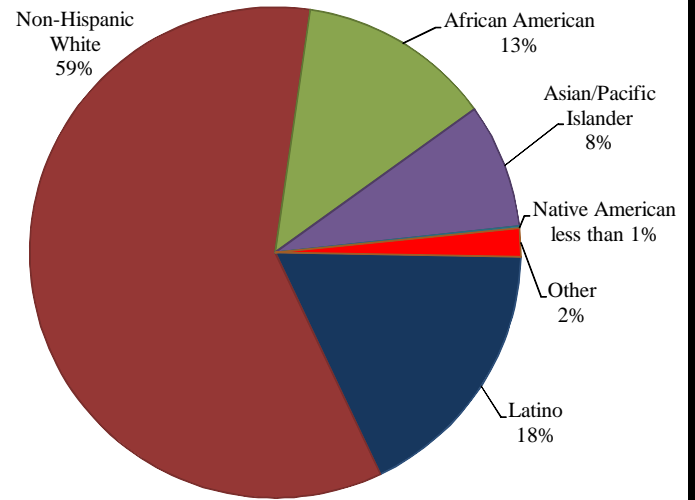
The Latino population increase between 2000 and 2010 exceeded the growth in other population groups (such as Asian/Pacific Islander and African American), and helped offset the decline in the Non-Hispanic White population.

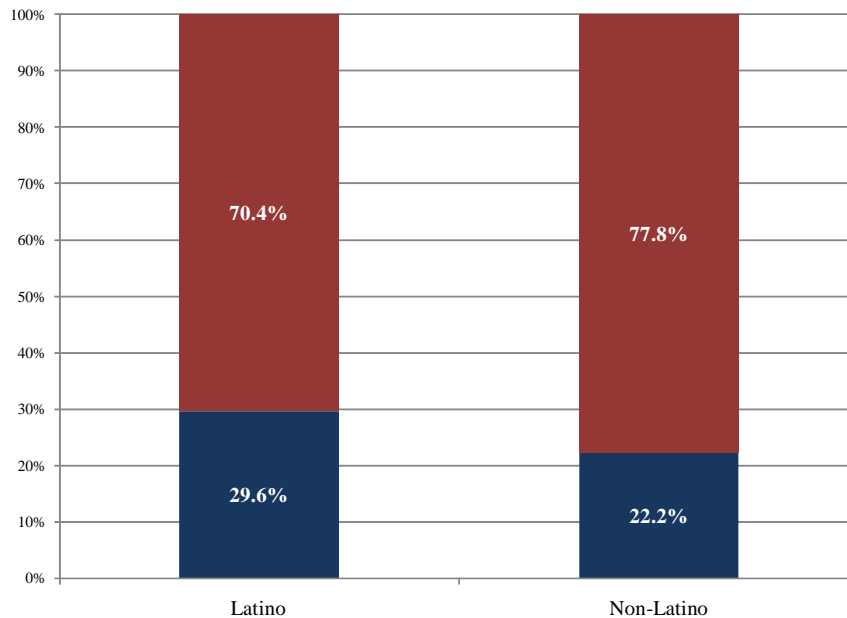
Between 2000 and 2010, the Latino share of the population grew from 13% to 18%. In 2000, about two-thirds of New Jerseyans were Non-Hispanic White (66%); in 2010, Non-Hispanic Whites were 59% of the population.

AGE OF POPULATION

In 2010, 461,001 Latinos were under 18, and 1.1 million were 18 and older. Latinos comprise 22% of all New Jerseyans under 18.

In 2010, New Jersey's Latino population was somewhat younger than the non-Latino population. Thirty percent of New Jersey's Latinos were under 18, compared to 22% of non-Latinos.



COUNTY AND CITY POPULATIONS: 2010

Census 2010 data reveal that many of New Jersey's 10 largest counties have significant Latino populations. The Latino share of these counties' population ranges from 8% in Ocean County to 42% in Hudson County. Additionally, nine of the major New Jersey counties are also home to the state's largest Latino communities, including Bergen County, Middlesex County, Essex County, Hudson County, Monmouth County, Union County, Camden County, Passaic County and Morris County. The state's 10 largest counties are home to 83% of its Latino population, with 17% residing in Hudson County, and 12% in Passaic County.

Many of New Jersey's 10 largest cities and townships also have significant Latino populations. The Latino share of these jurisdictions' population ranges from 8% in Toms River to 85% in Union City. Additionally, eight of New Jersey's major cities and townships are also home to the state's largest Latino communities, including Newark, Jersey City, Paterson, Elizabeth, Trenton, Camden, Passaic and Union City. The state's 10 cities and townships are home to one-third (34%) of New Jersey's Latino population.
